"It doesn't seem important until senior year when you are applying for schools and scholarships and you realize how much more you could have done."



The Athletic Training staff maintains all medical records for athletes, coordinates physicals, doctor's visits, oversees rehabilitation of injured athletes, educated the athletes about proper hydration, nutrition, and prevention of athletic injuries.

Hargrove also is the District's Administrator for the Extracurricular Drug Testing program managed by the Superintendent's office as well as many other behind the scenes activities as directed by the Athletic Director.

Before Hargrove returned to MPHS, his previous work experience included working for an Orthopedic Surgeon, a Physical Therapy Clinic where he worked as an Athletic Trainer for LeTourneau University, and the National Football league.



Calculator team wins state; math group finishes second

Ayear filled with hard work, numerous meets and long bus rides came to a fruitful end for the high school Calculator Application and Math teams.

The Calculator Applications team won the UIL State Championship with the Math team second.

The Calculator Applications team of Carlos Barboza, Daniel Hernandez, Husban Shahid and Sanum Shahid beat second place team Wisdom High School from Houston by 56 points.

Husban Shahid earned 5th place and medaled in the event while Daniel Hernan-

dez placed 7th.

"It felt surreal after winning both state in Calculator Applications and placing second in Math," Shahid said. "It didn't feel real and was a really weird but exciting

experience."

The Math team of Jose Liera, Daniel Hernandez, David Barboza, and Husban Shahid trailed first place team Highland Park by 52 points but beat third place team Lubbock High School by 132 points. Jose Liera placed 1st and Daniel Hernandez tied for 4th. Both received individual medals as well as a team medal.

"It feels extremely satisfying knowing that we worked hard to earn those places," Liera said.

Students faced a variety of challenges this year from self-improvent to dealing with grades.

"The biggest challenge was improving my own score

For Valedictorian Husban Shahid, he had many chal-

lenges this year.

"One of the biggest challenges for me this year was trying to incresase my UIL scores, while having extracurricular activities, maintaining high grades and having my own cell repair business," Husban Shahid said.

For Liera, he said going up against Highland Park was a challenge for the team.

"Their scores were really high, and it was hard imagining ourselves up there with them in the real UIL competitions," Liera said.

While students faced various challenges, as you can expect the students find math fun and have various reasons why

"Math is fun for me because there is multiple ways to work problems and there is always an answer," Sanum Shahid said. "Therefore, math never gets boring because there is so much to it."

Sanum said the easiest part for math to her is that there is

always a solution.

"I find it easy in the fact taht there's always an answer whether it's crunching numbers and problem solving," Sanum said. "The challenge in itself is what I love and that's what I find easy."

Liera agreed with Sanum that math is easy for him.

"Math is a series of logical steps and a lot of relationships with the numbers to know," Liera said. "Once you know the logic behind a topic, it becomes easy."

Husban Shahid said math is fun "because it reminds me of a Rubik's Cube. There are endliess ways to solve each problem and can be tackled from different perspectives."


At first, I thought that I couldn't dance in front of everybody but I grew in courage over time.




