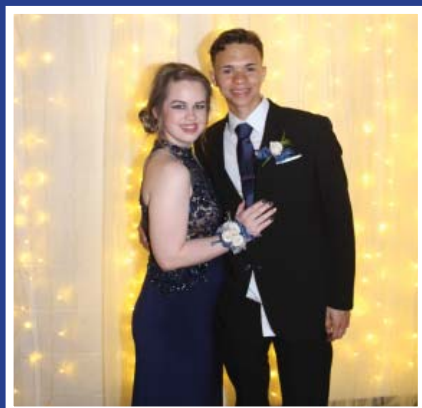

She plays on the varsity tennis team and has been a member of NHS, NTHS, HOSA, Rotary Club and FFA.

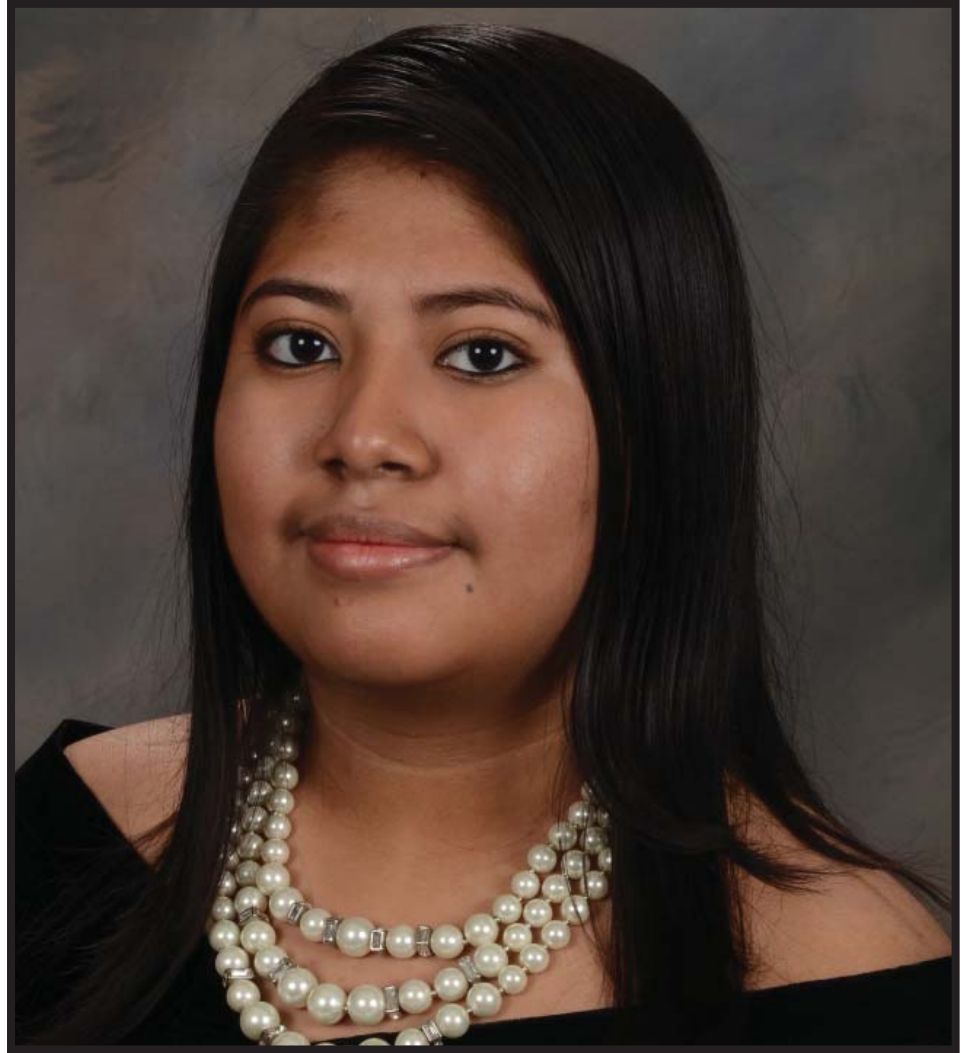
She considers her greatest achievements are being accepted into Stephen F. Austin State University as well as being accepted into the honors program at NTCC.

Chaplain Ashley Tabor.

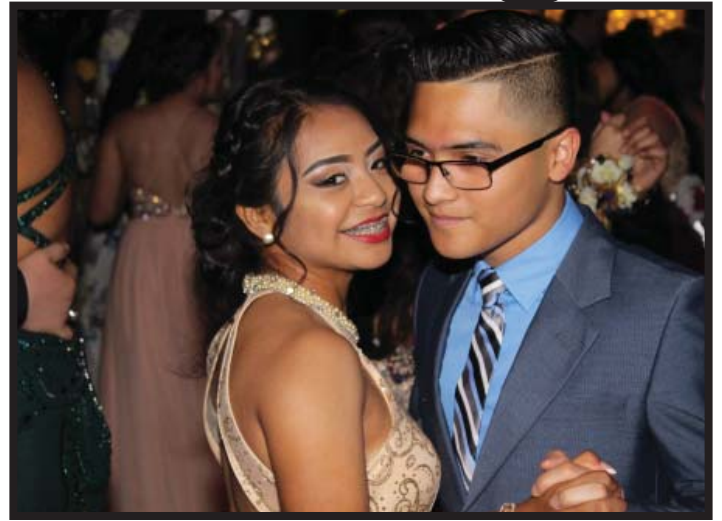
During the banquet, FFA recognized many award winners and scholarship recipients for this school year. Also the chapter recognized those students who helped with the tornado clean-up in DeKalb.

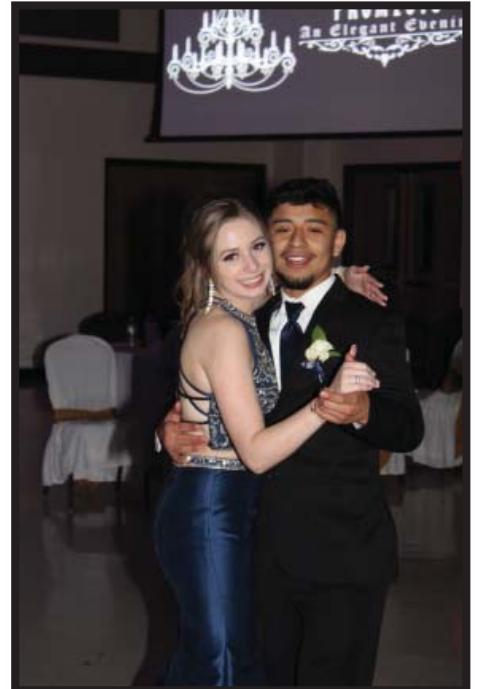
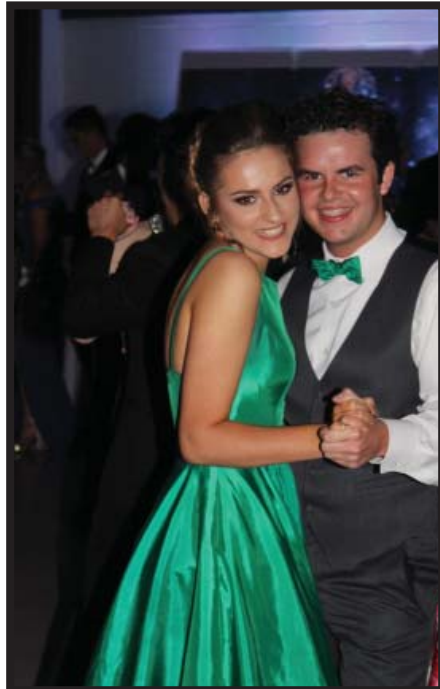

"When I gave her the solo part in my squad routine, she gave me the craziest look and when she heard the part she wasn't very happy. She still killed it every time." -- **Abigail Amerson, 12th grade**

Cancelling the Friday night show the Dolls focused on their Saturday performance. They did not fill any of the spots Suzanna

Lisette De Jesus - Continue a year in the Medical Assistant program while taking basics for college, then transfer to UT-Tyler to study for a Physician Assistant.

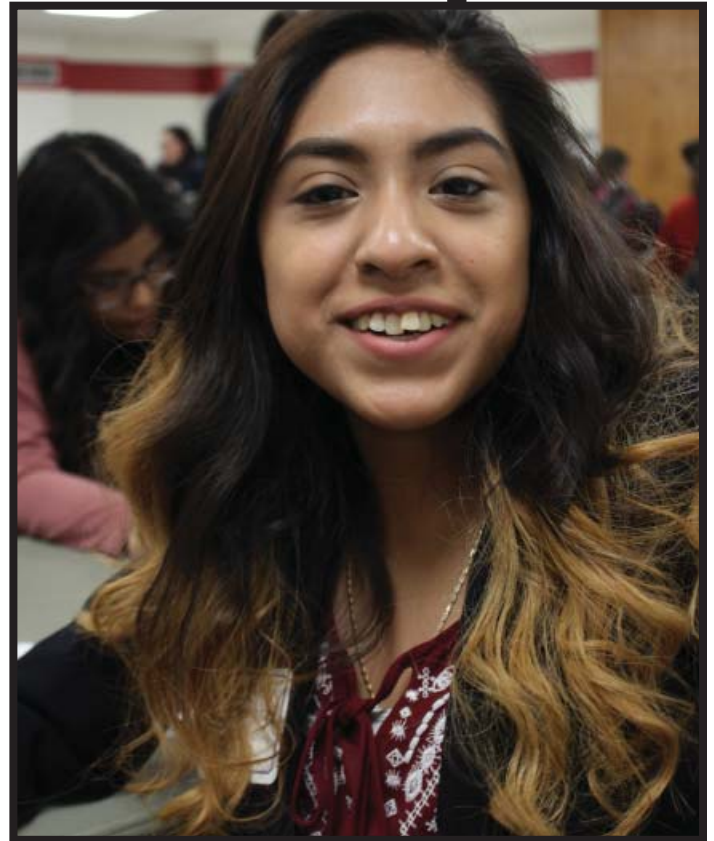

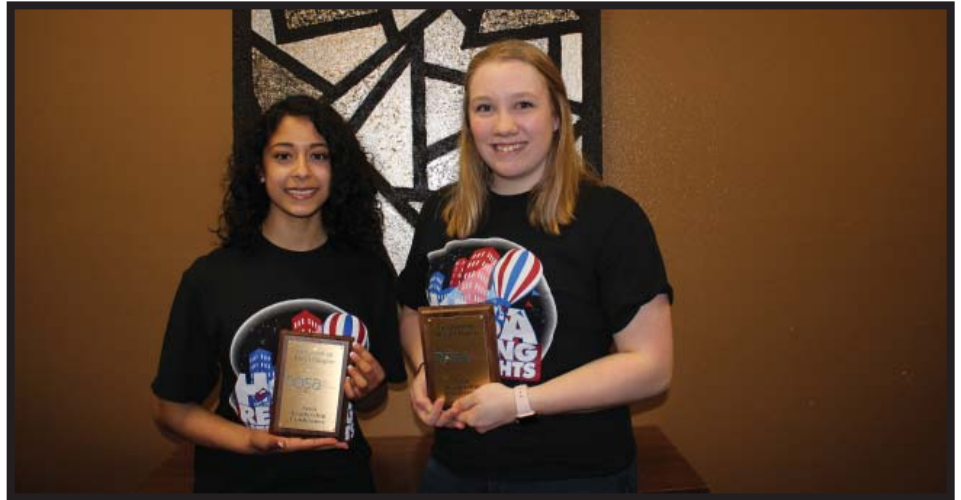
MPHS HOSA recently took 19 students to the Gaylord Texan Resort in Grapevine, Texas for the State Leadership Conference on April 11.

“I’m ready to put my health care knowledge to the test and I can’t wait to see how I do.

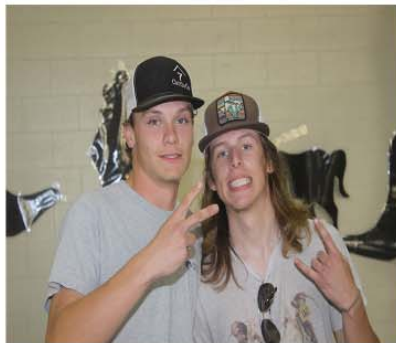
This past year has been extremely successful overall for our HOSA chapter.

I've been very lucky and have been to most of our states and traveled to Mexico, Belize and throughout Europe.

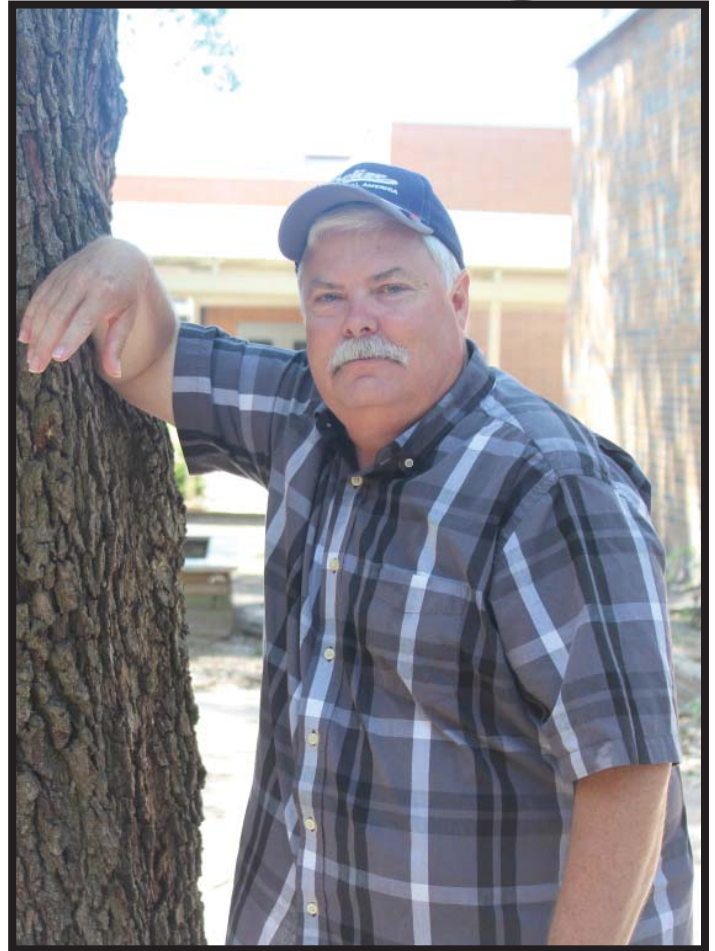
12. What are you planning to do this summer?
