gets to practice what she loves. Her favorite places to eat are Mexican restaurants.


Soto is 17 years old and the daughter of Kenya Marmolejo, and was escorted by her brother Gerardo.

She is active in soccer and also earned a participation award in FFA. Her hobbies include doing makeup and playing soccer.








The varsity team currently consists of five seniors, which are all four year members of the volleyball team.

Over 1.5 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools entered the 2020 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2018 PSAT, which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state.

The number of Semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

To become a Finalist, the Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic

record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT® or ACT® scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test.

From the approximately 16,000 Semifinalists, about 15,000 are expected to advance to the Finalist level, and in February they will be notified of this designation.

National Merit Schol-

arship winners of 2020 will be announced in four nationwide news releases beginning in April and concluding in July.

These scholarship recipients will join more than 345,000 other distinguished young people who have earned the Merit Scholar title.

Having only a few short weeks to prepare, each piece required a high level of skill, as well as a mastery of the


Jazz style. MPHS was well represented at the audition, making up 32 percent of the All Region Jazz Band.

chair Trumpet). This is Rider's 2nd year to make the All-Region Jazz Band.




