Newman enjoys spending time with her real and cheer family.


Newman said her favorite food is bar-b-que baby back ribs and her favorite restaurant is Texas Road House.




"Music is my God given gift," Kessler said.

Barrientos is involved in step team, cross country, soccer, book club, debate, track, and UBO.


Her future plans include attending Florida State University and playing soccer. Her favorite subject is science because of the lab work and learning about DNA and RNA entertain her.

Baker has taught in more






Rosemichael Yusinco-Cowgill is the new 9th grade environmental systems teacher. She graduated

Smith has high hopes for the season as well.



Not only is their height a challenge, but having lower classmen on varsity can present its own challenge.


“The biggest challenge this year as a sophomore on varsity has been the transition and the continuing pressure,” said Shelbi Haupt.

Six inducted into Tiger Athletic Hall of Fame

Four former MPHS athletes and two former head coaches were honored Friday, Oct. 9 when they become the second group of former athletes and coaches inducted into the Tiger Athletic Hall of Fame.

Maury Buford, R.E. Dodson, Richard Rockwell, Leslie Harris Slovak, Charles Wright and the late Herb Zimmerman (represented by his wife Dorothy) were officially inducted into the Hall of Fame during pregame of the Tigers vs. Hallsville game.

They also served as honorary captains for the game and participate in the pre-game coin toss.

This year's inductees were chosen by a selection committee based on their accomplishments while at Mount Pleasant High School.

As recognition of their selection, each inductee will also receive a gold jacket featuring the Athletic Hall of Fame crest. Pictures of each inductee will also be displayed in the hallway of the Willie Williams Gymnasium. Guaranty Bank and Trust is the official sponsor of the annual event.

Maury Anthony Buford

As a Mount Pleasant High School student,

Buford played football, baseball, and ran track. He was also a member of the National Honor Society. During his high school athletic career, he and teammates won all district in football, baseball and track. He broke a long-standing school record in the 880 -yard dash and was a member of the State Champion Tiger baseball team in 1978.

Buford attended Texas Tech University where he served as a member of the football team from 1978-1981. He was named to the All Southwest Conference Team for two years and had the highest punting average in the nation my freshman year. Buford was drafted by the San Diego Chargers in the spring of 1978 and won Super Bowl XX with the Chicago Bears during the 1985 season.

R.E. Dodson

Dodson, a 1957 graduate of Mount Pleasant High School, played football, basketball and ran track all three varsity years.

His many high school accolades include: 1955 All District Football for both offense

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and defense; 1956 All District Football again both offense and defense; 1956 Honorable Mention All State Football; 1955 Regional Champion in the 440-yard relay and MPHS Most Athletic 1957.

He was offered football scholarships to all Southwest Conference schools and to Oklahoma, Dodson chose Texas Christian University. He was a letterman on back-to-back SWC Championship teams in 1958 and 1959.

Richard Rockwell

Rockwell participated in track and field and played football while at MPHS. He was a member of the 1972 and 1973 district champion football teams as a running back and also a member of the 1973 State Football finalist team. In 1972, he was a member of the state track championship team and the 1973 state track runner-up team. He participated in the 400 meters at the state meet his senior year in 1974.

Leslie Slovak

Slovak played basketball, volleyball and tennis at MPHS. She was named all district and all region in basketball, three time all district in volleyball, twice named all region and all state in volleyball. She also played in the TOGA volleyball all-star game and was academic all-state in volleyball.

She attended East Texas State University, now Texas AM University-Commerce, where she played volleyball. She was a three time all conference, four time Lone Star Conference Player of the week, set the NCAA record for all division I, II and III schools for most kills in a match, third on the all-time kill list at AM Commerce and third on the all-time list for most aces.

Charles Wright

Wright served in almost ev-

ery capacity known in his 37 years with Mount Pleasant ISD. He worked as a teacher, counselor, teacher evaluator, assistant superintendent and superintendent.

As a coach, he coached eighth grade in all sports at P.E. Wallace, ninth grade in football and track, was varsity assistant football coach working with the defense and head track coach at Mount Pleasant High School.

A graduate of MPHS, Wright was captain of the football team his senior year and made several all-tournament teams in basketball.

Herb Zimmerman

Zimmerman grew up on a farm outside Mt. Vernon and graduated from Mt. Vernon High School. He attended TCU where he played football. He made all SW Conference and in his senior year (1952) he also made honor-

able mention All American. He was drafted by the Green Bay Packers his senior year at TCU, but due to an injury was unable to report to Green Bay.

He took an assistant football coaching job in Weatherford and in 1955 came to Mount Pleasant. At the time, the program was in disarray. Herb and his assistant coaches, John Maughon and Sam Morrow took the program from a losing situation to the state semi-finals in 1959 where they lost to Breckenridge.

After the 1959 season, Coach John Bridgers at Baylor University hired Herb as a defensive coach and later defensive coordinator. After the 1966 season, Coach Hayden Frey called Herb to come to SMU as the defensive coordinator. In 1995, he was inducted into the TCU Sports Hall of Fame,

Shelby Daniels took first overall in the Titus County Fair Invitational JV girls division with a time of 14:14.36. Morgan Martin was next for the Lady Tigers in third at 15:10.72.

Zurishaddai Moreno placed sixth in 15:54.76, Malin Sauermann seventh at 16:25.03, Andrea Flores 14th at 17:29.10 and Ashley Rodriguez 21st at 18:43.47.

Coming to America: Two *foreign exchange students adjusting to living in America, going to school here*

Two German foreign exchange girls are spending their year at MPHS and experiencing the daily life of an American teenager.

Their names are Clara Gleixner and Malin Saurermann. They came from different parts of Germany.

Both are enjoying their stay here in Texas as the school year passes by, with the girls becoming accustomed to the life of an American high school student.

"Yes I love it, everything is different and bigger," Gleixner said.

"Yes I love it. It's very cool here but very different from what I expected," Saurermann said.

Both find Texas to be huge and different in many ways from how things are in Germany. They seem to enjoy the differences despite the fact that it is not what they are used to.

According to both Gleixner and Saurermann, their high school system is very different compared to what we Americans are used to here.

For the most part, an average school day in Germany only lasts until 12:00 p.m., while here we stay till 3:50 p.m. In Clara's school, they attend school on Saturdays since it is a boarding school.

In German schools, the class system varies with the day by only having specific classes held on a certain day.

"School here is very different and great but I am not used to being here for such a long time, but am glad about not going on Saturdays," Gleixner said.

As foreigners to America, both have experienced and noticed weird things since they've been here.

"Nobody here rides a train or

walks from place to place and nobody has a WhatsApp," Clara said.

The transportation system in Texas is way different from what Gleixner is used to since it is a common way to go to place to place in Germany.

There are several differences between Germany and Texas that separate us from them greatly. For the most part, Gleixner has noticed that people do not smoke in school here like they do in Germany.

"Any student is able to smoke at my school," Clara said.

"It is not that different here from Germany in many ways," Saurermann said. Malin has noticed that both places are pretty similar even if it may not seem like it to Americans.

The food here in America came out to be both of the girls' most favorite thing about our country. Both girls enjoy multiple foods made here in Texas since it is a very cultural blended society with all types of nationalities.

With Hispanic food and traditional Texan meals, both girls have become very fond of these traditional plates served here and absolutely love them greatly even if it is not their average

meal from Germany.
