Project MP SAFE seeks to inform on emergency health protocol

The team of Natalie Crockett, Ethan Harbour, Perla Guzman, and Paulina Diaz created Project MP SAFE (Safely Administer First Aid Every time) as part as their HOSA Community Awareness project.

Inspired by the new safety protocol implemented at MPISD over the past few months, our Community Awareness initiative consisted of instructing students and faculty of the school district on emergency health protocol.

Because of rurality of our area, access to CPR, Stop the Bleed, and other First Aid instructional classes is limited, and we wanted to increase community accessibility to this knowledge through free classes.

With this initiative, we community-wide classes on the first Saturdays of October and November MPISD's Administration building. Additionally, on our Facebook page, we procedures for those unable to attend an in-person class.

We also instructed FBLA's middle level chapter at Wallace, MPISD custodians, the MPISD maintenance department, MPHS Law Enforcement, and MPHS HOSA. Our instruction mainly focused on CPR, Stop the Bleed, anaphylaxis, heart attacks, choking, burns, and sprain treatment.

Our reasons for choosing this topic were multitudinous, however, we were mainly focused on the statistics surrounding emergency situations and survival rates over time.

For example, according to the New England Journal of Medicine, severe bleeding accounts for 35% of pre-hospital deaths and nearly 40% of deaths within the first 24 hours of injury.

Knowledge of how to stop severe bleeding in a timely manner could reduce this statistic significantly. Additionally, sudden cardiac death is the largest cause of natural

posted summaries of various death in the United States and around 705 of Americans are reluctant to perform CPR due to unease regarding their skill in the subject.

> As time goes on, chances of resuscitation without permanent neurological damage decreases significantly. We hoped that though our instruction, we could refresh memories and make people more confident in performing CPR, applying tourniquets, etc...through practice.

> This HOSA project will presented before a panel of judges in at the HOSA Texas Area 3 Leadership Conference in January. The event consists of a compilation of all we accomplished in the form of a portfolio as well as a five-minute speech summarizing our initiative and why it is important to us.

> With this project, we thoroughly hope that we were able to raise awareness for the lack of access to emergency protocol instruction, and increase the accessibility of this instruction to our community.

Debate competes at Longhorn Classic

The Mount Pleasant High School Speech and Debate team competed at the Longhorn Classic on the campus of The University of Texas at Austin on December 2-4. The tournament featured 111 schools from 10 states. MP Speech and Debate took six team members who competed in three different categories and brought home two medals.

In Lincoln Douglas debate, senior Anthony Orellana made history, becoming the first MPHS team member to advance to Octafinals in that event. The field began day one with 160 competitors. Orellana defeated opponents from Southlake Carroll, St. Mary's Hall, St. Agnes, and Plano East for a 4-2 record and a 22nd seed out of prelims.

He then defeated competitors from The Greenhill School and Westwood and was finally eliminated by an opponent from Prospect High School in California. He finished in the top 16 out of 160 for his final appearance at the Longhorn Classic.

The placement also secured the final

points he needed to qualify for the Texas Forensic Association (TFA) State Tournament in March.

Junior Angelina Hernandez and sophomore Gopi Amin also competed in LD with each picking up wins and valuable national level experience.

In Individual Events, senior Madeline Tumey-Simmons medaled as a quarterfinalist in Oral Interpretation. The field began day one with 84 competitors. After prelims, Tumey-Simmons finished in the top 32, just narrowly missing advancing to semifinals by one rank in her final appearance at the Longhorn Classic. Newcomer Elijah Rider also competed in Oral Interpretation, seeing success in his very first national level tournament. Senior Merlin Cardona competed in Congressional Debate, gaining valuable experience and practice for UIL State.

MP Speech and Debate will compete in one final tournament before Christmas break then will turn their attention to the UIL State Congressional meet in January.

Tigers win own basketball tourney

The Mount Pleasant Tigers wasted no time in proving they were the best team on the court last weekend as the 4th Annual TRMC Tiger Town Tournament hosted twenty teams vying for the tournament crown. The Tigers went a perfect 5-0 in the large school division taking the tournament championship by defeating Princeton, Braswell, Azle, Corsicana, and Crandall. Chapel Hill also went undefeated to win the small school division, defeating Atlanta in the championship game.

Mt. Pleasant 61 Princeton 35 The Tigers opened the tournament on Thursday with a convincing win against recent 5A addition Princeton. Mount Pleasant jumped out to a 15-7 lead after the first quarter and led 32-15 at halftime. Defense would be the theme of the tournament as the Tigers forced 26 turnovers and dominated in the paint with a 36-14 advantage around the rim. 
