
"I would be interested in uniforms so that way I don't have to worry about what to wear each morning. I personally think faculty handles dress code well," a student said.

"To improve my technique and set new personal records," Sophie Greco said.


"My goal this year is to reach my maximum capacity and overall beat my fastest time," Hugo Bernardi said.


